SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available to Utah Small Businesses

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Small nonfarm businesses in 10 Utah counties and neighboring counties in Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico are now eligible to apply for low-interest federal disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration, announced Director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA’s Disaster Field Operations Center-West. These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by drought in the following primary counties that began April 1, 2018.

Primary Utah counties: Kane, San Juan and Wayne;

Neighboring Utah counties: Emery, Garfield, Grand, Iron, Piute, Sevier and Washington;

Neighboring Arizona counties: Apache, Coconino, Mohave and Navajo;

Neighboring Colorado counties: Dolores, Mesa, Montezuma, Montrose and San Miguel;

Neighboring New Mexico county: San Juan.

“SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster,” Garfield said.

Small nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

“Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 3.58 percent for businesses and 2.5 percent for private nonprofit organizations, a maximum term of 30 years and are available to small businesses and most private nonprofits without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship,” Garfield said.

By law, SBA makes Economic Injury Disaster Loans available when the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. The Secretary declared this disaster on April 12, 2018.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the Secretary’s declaration. However, nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance in drought disasters.

The deadline to apply for economic injury is Dec. 12, 2018.
